WELCOME TO FORTH VALLEY HOSPITALS

NHS Forth Valley Hospitals serve a population of approximately 300,000.

The new Forth Valley Royal Hospital (FVRH) opened in Larbert in July 2010. The majority of the functionality from Falkirk Community Hospital (FCH) was transferred to FVRH at that time as the phase one move was conducted. Phase two took place in September 2010 and phase three in July 2011 saw the transfer of Stirling Royal Infirmary into FVRH. Which has a 24/7 Emergency Department and all Medical Services apart from Cardiothoracic Surgery and Neurosurgery. It also has a Women & Childrens Department which includes neo-natal, paediatric and Obstetrics/Gynaecology Departments. A full range of diagnostic facilities is available on site including an MRI scanner. There are comprehensive Laboratory and Library facilities.

Following the completion of the transition to FVRH the sites at Falkirk and Stirling are being redeveloped into community hospitals with a range of services.

The student accommodation remains at the Falkirk site.

The Department of Medicine comprises 9 wards and 184 beds in FVRH. This includes the Clinical Assessment Unit and Acute Assessment Unit for acute medical admissions which take in the majority of medical emergencies of all ages. There is a purpose built Cardiology Ward with 14 beds There is also a High Dependency Unit which is shared with Surgical Patients and a Critical Care Department which again caters for both medical and surgical patients. The Medical Directorate covers a broad range of medical conditions with an average of 60 emergency admissions daily. The special interests of the Directorate include Cardiology, Gastroenterology, Diabetes/Endocrinology, Respiratory, Haematology, Dermatology, Rheumatology, Acute Geriatric Medicine and Infectious Diseases. There are also Acute Physicians assessing and triaging admissions.

The Medical Directorate teaches Students from Edinburgh and Glasgow Universities. At any one time there may be 8 Medicine Students from Edinburgh University on attachment in their

final year and 5 from Glasgow University on attachment in either their fourth or third year. The Edinburgh Students are attached for 4 weeks, the third year Glasgow Students for 5 weeks and the fourth year Glasgow students for 10 weeks.

Your Lead Tutor for General Medicine, for Edinburgh Students is Dr Wood, Consultant Respiratory Physician and will be a contact for you throughout your time in Forth Valley and if there are any problems during your attachment please arrange to see him (contact his Secretary, Debbie Laing ext: 66826).

Learning Objectives:

Your learning objectives during the your attachment in Medicine are mapped out in the Learn medical curriculum. Not all the learning objectives will be covered by tutorials or lectures but are an indicator of the content that will be covered in that part of the course. You should use the objectives as a guide to your reading and the learning opportunities that are available in Forth Valley. In Year 6 there is a strong emphasis on preparation for the Foundation Years. Year 6 Students should be capable of assisting a Doctor in a clinic, ward, surgery or operating theatre and should become valued members of the Healthcare Team. It is an opportunity to consolidate the knowledge and competencies that have been gained in the previous 5 years.

The teaching will take the form of tutorials via Teams as well asCDF Led Bedside Teaching and ward based work. These sessions will be problem based either on topics such as prescribing, acid base disturbances, management of acute emergencies etc. or being patient centred around history and examination. You will also be tutored in being able to interpret investigations such as full blood count, U&Es, blood gases, ECG and chest x-rays. You will be expected to engage in performing all common practical procedures including venflons, venepunctures, arterial blood gases etc. If you are not able to do these procedures, please make sure that you are taught by a member of staff before attempting it on a patient. You will then be expected to become proficient in each of these techniques (this is important as when you are an FY1 you will often only be asked to do these techniques when other, non medical staff, have failed). You should also acquaint yourself with other procedures that you will need to inform patients about when you are qualified, by observing lumbar punctures, central line insertions, temporary pacing,

endoscopies, exercise tolerance tests, pulmonary function tests etc. During your attachment you will be assigned to your supervisor's team. The various wards are Ward B31 general medicine including respiratory, Ward B32 GI unit, Ward A12 general medicine Including Endocrine and Haematology, Ward A31 Infectious Diseases, CCU – coronary care unit – acute cardiac, HDU – acute medical problems and the cardiology ward.

You will be expected to attend medical out-patient clinics in relevant specialties . You will also be able to attend FY1 and FY2 teaching sessions via teams.

At the end of your attachment we expect you to be proficient in history taking and examination in all systems of medicine. To have clinical skills in common practical procedures and the ability to devise a management plan for all common medical conditions. You should be able to interpret common ECG abnormalities, chest x-rays, electrolytes and acid based disorders. You should know how to complete a death certificate, cremation form and how to retrieve information from the Laboratory in the hospital computer system. You should learn how to prescribe. You should be able to build sufficient patient/doctor rapport in order to counsel patients undergoing practical procedures and health promotion issues. You should have an appreciation of the role of the Doctor in the Health Service Team and also what will be expected of you when you start to work as an FY1. You should have an appreciation of the importance of communication skills with both patients and staff.

Information Booklet:

Please read and retain the information contained in this booklet as it contains details of your commitments during your attachment. Many opportunities for learning are contained in this information booklet which you will need to organise and it is up to you as to how you best use the facilities available in Forth Valley. The booklet also refers to important issues such as information security, infection control and guidelines for medical students. It is helpful to let us know before you leave exactly what you think of the student experience in Forth Valley, what works well and what you feel needs improvement. This will help to improve the experience of medical students that follow you.

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Lectures/Teaching:

Edinburgh 6th year Students will spend a total of 4 weeks in Forth Valley. During this time you will be on nights for one week and spend one weekend on acute receiving.

You should attend at least one out-patient clinic in each of the medical specialties ie. respiratory, cardiology, gastroenterology, endocrinology (or more if you wish). Consultants are agreeable to let you sit with them but only one student at a time. Occasionally if they are particularly busy they may suggest coming back another day.

You should also attend ward rounds, both acute receiving ward rounds and general ward rounds and not be afraid to ask questions. You should write up as many patients as possible and present them to Medical Staff and in particular make sure you present at least one case per week to your supervising Consultant. There will also be opportunities for you to attend ward rounds in Palliative Care with Dr Sarah Miller, Specialist Consultant in palliative care. The majority of teaching is currently delivered via Teams and all teaching sessions will be posted on the 'Events' section of the Medical Education website under Undergraduate

Undergraduate Medical Education Facilities:

FVRH:

The Library and computer room in FVRH are located on the second floor of F block, which is the round building at the front of the hospital, there is 24 hour access to the library and computer rooms, after hours they can only be accessed from the second floor ward corridor.

Format of General Medicine Attachment in Forth Valley:

During your attachment please base yourself in your Educational Supervisor's ward All of the medicine Consultant's rotas include weeks when they are Consultant of the Week (CoW) this is the week that they will spend based on their home ward, as opposed to On-Call, front door etc. Please ascertain from your Educational Supervisor/Secretary which week(s) this will be during your attachment. It is important that you join your supervisor on the ward during that time. Outwith these times you are free to attend other wards/departments/clinics, However should you wish to spend time on another ward please speak to the undergraduate co-ordinator to arrange this in order that there are the appropriate number of students on any given ward.

This will help cover a lot of your ILOs and give you a rounded experience. If you are unsure how to do this email or speak to your clinical supervisor.

Key points for your attachment in Medicine:

Edinburgh Students do a 4 week attachment during those 4 weeks you will also be expected to do a week of nights and a weekend.

During your time on the wards you should attend Consultant ward rounds and present cases on these ward rounds. You can present cases with the Junior Staff but present at least one case per week to your supervising Consultant. You should also spend time with the Junior Doctors, learning ongoing management of the patients and also helping them with everyday tasks such

as venflons, blood gases, chasing and interpreting blood results, ECGs, writing cardexes (but not signing for drugs). This contribution to the team will be valuable experience for FY1.

At any one time you should be familiar with the total care and management of 2 or 3 patients in your ward. You should act as their FY1 Doctor as far as possible for writing in notes and ward rounds and writing cardexes (but not signing for drugs).

Out-Patient Clinics - opportunities for clinics are detailed in the timetables included in this pack and you can sign up to attend a clinic on the google spreadsheet, you will be given the links electronically to the spreadsheet at the outset of the attachment. You will be expected to attend at least 1 clinic (more if you wish) in each of the medical sub-specialities, ie. Respiratory, Cardiology, Endocrinology and Gastroenterology and Neurology. If you wish to attend please check with the consultant's secretary beforehand, as the clinics scheduled do not take account of the rota for on-call weeks, acute receiving weeks, ward weeks, annual leave, study leave etc. There should never been more than 1 Student in with a Consultant at any one time. Please note that clinics are sometimes cancelled if Consultants are away so you **need** to check in advance.

Assessment

1. Clinical skills

As before, tutors will provide an overall assessment of the student's performance, taking into account interactions with the student and the following:

- Direct clinical observations (formerly postcards)
 - Students will expected to complete **2 direct clinical observations**. One should focus on history taking and one should focus on examination skills.
 - These should be observed with feedback provided in real time

Task-based assessments

- Students will be expected to complete 2 task-based assessments.
- This is a new style of assessment which focuses on how students perform important clinical tasks that they will be required to do as a new FY1. In medicine we will be focusing on the task of clerking in an acute admission. The idea is that after working with the student for a series of shifts (e.g. a on call/weekend) when they will have clerked in a variety of patients with a variety of complexities, you would make a global judgement of how much supervision you feel the student would need when clerking in a straightforward case going forward. You will note that this differs from existing workplace based assessments, like mini-CEX, in being longitudinal and contextualised.
- You may be familiar with this assessment process which is already in use in the assistantship module. I will provide more guidance about this assessment process in due course.

2. Professionalism

As before, professionalism forms an important part of the assessment process

3. Case Report (portfolio report)

 Portfolio case There will now be a 2000 word limit (excluding any front cover and reference page). The report should be in the form of a discharge OR handover
 Letter. Guidance for students will be available on Learn

- Section 1 should focus on the clinical aspects of the patient journey.
- Section 2 (discussion) should include a basic sciences section followed by a discussion of 2 programme themes directly relevant to the case.

During your time you should attend any investigations or interventions that you have not seen before or would like to have further experience of, eg. spend half a day in cardiac investigation seeing echos etc, see CT scans, CT guided biopsies, bronchoscopies, endoscopies etc. Also attend specialist clinics or many of the other opportunities available to you and you will find invaluable. The Day Medicine department in Ambulatory Care is a goldmine for observing and helping with many procedures.

Teaching - see timetable

Professional Behaviour - You are expected to be available 9am to 5pm (or hours as timetable) on a daily basis. Your behaviour on the wards should be as it is to be employed as an FY1. If you need time off please arrange as above.

Assessment:

Your supervisor will conduct an end of block assessment with you and fill out the assessment. Your portfolio case should be uploaded to PebblePad and a ticket sent to your supervisor.
