

NHS Forth Valley Hospitals serve a population of approximately 300,000.

The new Forth Valley Royal Hospital (FVRH) opened in Larbert in July 2010. The majority of the functionality from Falkirk Community Hospital (FCH) was transferred to FVRH at that time as the phase one move was conducted. Phase two took place in September 2010 and phase three in July 2011 saw the transfer of Stirling Royal

Following the completion of the transition to FVRH the sites at Falkirk and Stirling are being redeveloped into community hospitals with a range of services.

The student accommodation remains at the Falkirk site.

The Department of Medicine comprises 9 wards and 184 beds in FVRH. This includes the Clinical Assessment Unit and Acute Assessment Unit for acute medical admissions which take in the majority of medical emergencies of all ages. There is a Cardiology Ward with 14 beds. There is also a High Dependency Unit which is shared with Surgical Patients and a Critical Care Department which again caters for both medical and surgical patients. The Medical Directorate covers a broad range of medical conditions with an average of 60 emergency admissions daily. The special interests of the Directorate include Cardiology, Gastroenterology, Diabetes/Endocrinology, Respiratory, Haematology, Dermatology, Rheumatology, Acute Geriatric Medicine and Infectious Diseases. There are also Acute Physicians assessing and triaging admissions.

The Medical Directorate teaches Students from Edinburgh and Glasgow Universities. At any one time there may be 8 Medicine Students from Edinburgh University on attachment in their final year and 5 Medicine Students from Glasgow University on attachment in either their fourth or third year. The Edinburgh Students are attached for 4 weeks, the fourth year Glasgow Students for 10 weeks and the third year Glasgow students for 5 weeks.

The Lead Tutor and sub-dean on site for Glasgow students is Dr Chris Kelly, Consultant Endocrine Physician and Deputy Director of Medical Education, he will be a contact for you throughout your time in Forth Valley and if there are any problems during your attachment he can be contacted via his secretary Pauline Martin on ext: 66346

Learning Objectives Adult Medicine:

The specific learning objectives will be contained in your university curriculum and ILOs

Clinical learning objectives

The purpose of your clinical block is to learn the practical and clinical skills required of a doctor in training. You should embed yourself on your ward and attend the morning board and ward round and join the doctors in training. You can join the ward round, review new patients and present them on the ward round or clerk in new patients and follow them on their journey through their investigations and treatment.

The specific assessments and DOPs are detailed in your university logbooks

It may be necessary to work in a shift pattern on the ward. Either starting at 8am or 13:00 depending on how busy your unit is. If this is the case, we also provide detailed training in hand over and time management. Essential skills for modern medical practise.

General learning objectives:

- To act professionally with the highest standards of personal integrity and reliability.
- To use the appropriate knowledge base of clinical subjects and of their underpinning sciences.
- To communicate effectively with colleagues, patients and patients' relatives.
- To be able to obtain a history and perform an examination related to all body systems and record and present the findings in an organised fashion.
- To be able to interpret findings from history, examinations to produce an appropriate differential diagnosis and learn how to institute relevant management.
- To be able to assess prognosis and to plan and undertake continuing care.
- To be able to assess the urgency of a clinical situation and know when to seek the help of others.
- To be able to perform relevant clinical procedures.
- To be able to work as a member of a team recognising the role of other health professionals. This includes an awareness of the management of the health service.
- To develop an ability to analyse personal strengths and weaknesses, with a life long commitment to learning.

Ward Placement

All placements are ward based. It has been demonstrated that a minimum of 4 weeks on a ward is required to fully integrate yourself into an essential co-worker / learner.

If you are on a 10-week block then we will integrate a 2-week acute medicine placement which will include 1 or 2 nights.

You will be expected to attend medical out-patient clinics in relevant specialties as well as taking an active part in the weekly general medical meetings (Monday lunchtime). You will also be able to attend FY1 and FY2 teaching sessions.

Planned Absences:

Unplanned Absences:

If you are absent due to ill health you should telephone or e-mail Margot Robinson and your supervising Consultant's secretary as soon as possible. You should also observe your Universities absence reporting self certification procedures.

You are required to sign in each morning, the sign-in sheet is on the table outside the Undergraduate office.

Why is this important

Accurate information regarding your planned/unplanned absence is essential from a Health & Safety point of view as we need to be able to account for your whereabouts in the event of a hospital emergency.

We have been instructed by the University to report all absences to them.

Locker Key:

There are lockers available near the library and Undergraduate office at FVRH. Please ask the undergraduate co-ordinator for a key.

Swipe Card Access for FVRH:

Many areas in FVRH are only accessible by swipe card access, learning centre, theatres etc. Student swipe cards are available from the undergraduate co-ordinator. These cards also entitle you to staff discount in Starbucks.

Accommodation:

Limited accommodation is provided on the FCH site in the Junior Doctors Residence. Do not give your room keys to anyone else and do not exchange rooms without the prior permission of the Accommodation Manager, Karen Nimmo, or ring "0" for the switchboard and ask them to page you a domestic supervisor if you have any problems with your accommodation. Cooking facilities are available in the residences.

Please take care of your room keys and at the end of your attachment leave the keys in your room and ensure the room is locked before leaving. If you do not return the key this may mean another student will not have accommodation at the start of their attachment.

Travel expenses, to the equivalent rate of the bus fare, will be paid to students preferring not to stay in the accommodation.

Parking:

If you have a car with you it can be easily parked at the Falkirk site. There is access to the overflow purple car park at Larbert where the barriers are always raised. We would ask you not to park in the front visitor's /patient car park at FVRH

Public Transport

For students who do not have their own transport Forth Valley will provide weekly vouchers for First Buses. There is a Number 38 bus which travels between Stirling and Falkirk and which calls at FVRH en-route. This service runs approximately every 15 minutes. When handing your voucher to the bus driver ask for a One Zone weekly ticket

There is also an excellent bus service from Buchanan Bus Station which comes into the FVRH Hospital Grounds, X27, which takes about 35 minutes.

NHS FV ReSPECT

Lectures/Teaching:

Glasgow 3rd year student spend a total of 5 weeks, 4th year students spend a total of 10 weeks in Forth Valley. You should attend at least one out-patient clinic per week (or more if you wish). Consultants are agreeable to let you sit with them but only one student at a time. Occasionally if they are particularly busy they may suggest coming back another day.

You should also attend ward rounds, both acute receiving ward rounds and general ward rounds and not be afraid to ask questions. You should write up as many patients as possible and present them to Medical Staff and in particular make sure you present at least one case per week to your supervising Consultant. There will also be opportunities for you to attend ward rounds in Palliative Care with Dr Sarah Miller, Specialist Consultant in palliative care. The majority of teaching is currently delivered via Teams and all teaching sessions will be posted on the 'Events' section of the Medical Education website under Undergraduate.

Undergraduate Medical Education Facilities:

FVRH:

The Library and computer room in FVRH are located on the second floor of F block, which is the round building at the front of the hospital, there is 24 hour access to the library and computer rooms, after hours they can only be accessed from the second floor ward corridor.

FCH:

There is open access to wi-fi in the Junior Doctors Residence

Format of General Medicine Attachment in Forth Valley:

During your attachment please base yourself, in your Educational Supervisor's ward

All of the medicine Consultant's rotas include weeks when they are Consultant of the Week (CoW) this is the week that they will spend based on their home ward, as opposed to On-Call, front door etc. Please ascertain from your Educational Supervisor/Secretary which week(s) this will be during your attachment. It is important that you join your supervisor on the ward during that time. **Outwith these times you are free to attend other wards/departments/clinics. However should you wish to spend time on another ward please speak to the undergraduate co-ordinator to arrange this in order that there are the appropriate number of students on any given ward.**

(This will help cover a lot of your ILOs and give you a rounded experience). If you are unsure how to do this email or speak to your clinical supervisor

Key points for your attachment in Medicine:

Fourth year students do a 10 week attachment which is divided into 2 weeks on acute receiving, 1 week on Oncology at the Beatson, 1 week in Critical Care and 1 week when you will spend a day in Srathcarron Hospice and a day on the rounds with the Hospital Palliative Care Team and the remaining weeks on the wards, during those weeks you will also be encouraged to do a week of nights and a weekend.

During your time on the wards you should attend Consultant ward rounds and present cases on these ward rounds. You can present cases with the Junior Staff but present at least one case per week to your supervising Consultant. You should also spend time with the Junior Doctors, learning ongoing management of the patients and also helping them with everyday tasks such as venflons, blood gases, chasing and interpreting blood results, ECGs, writing cardexes (but not signing for drugs). This contribution to the team will be valuable experience for FY1.

At any one time you should be familiar with the total care and management of 2 or 3 patients in your ward. You should act as their FY1 Doctor as far as possible for writing in notes and ward rounds and writing cardexes (but not signing for drugs).

Out-Patient Clinics - You will be expected to attend at least 1 clinic (more if you wish) in each of the medical sub-specialities, ie. Respiratory, Cardiology, Endocrinology and Gastroenterology and Neurology. If you wish to attend please check with the consultant's secretary beforehand, as the clinics scheduled do not take account of the rota for on-call weeks, acute receiving weeks, ward weeks, annual leave, study leave etc. There should never been more than 1 Student in with a Consultant at any one time. Please note that clinics are sometimes cancelled if Consultants are away and you **need** to check in advance.

Assessment will be made on the basis of feedback from Consultants and Junior Doctors from your wards.

During your time you should attend any investigations or interventions that you have not seen before or would like to have further experience of, eg. spend half a day in cardiac investigation seeing echos etc, see CT scans, CT guided biopsies, bronchoscopies, endoscopies etc. Also attend specialist clinics or many of the other opportunities available to you and you will find invaluable.

Glasgow Students 4th year students will complete two portfolio cases, selected by the student during each five week period, two assessments of clinical examination skills and one case-based discussion. These evaluations will very closely resemble the mini-CEX and CBD assessments. The 3rd year assessment are identical over the 4 week blocks. The medical school requires all portfolios to be submitted to Turnitin for plagiarism checking

before uploading to ePortfolio, a ticket should be sent to your Supervisor in order that he/she can mark it.

Professional Behaviour - You are expected to be available 9am to 5pm (or hours as timetable) on a daily basis, with Wednesday afternoons off for sport. Your behaviour on the wards should be as it is to be employed as a FY1. If you need time off please arrange as above

undergraduate acute medicine placement planner

Situation

FVRH hosts undergraduate medical students from Glasgow University who require an acute medicine placement during their 10 week senior general medicine rotation.

Background

- The objectives of these placements include both clinical and process components.
- There are 5 students currently per block.
- During their rotation their 10 week medicine rotation the students are required to achieve the specified number of DOPs, professional behaviours and mini-cexes. A selection of these will be conducted during their acute medicine placement.

Recommendations

- Acute Medicine attachments for each student will comprise of 2 consecutive weeks.
- Dr Metcalfe will oversee these attachments – if any queries please contact on email holly.metcalfe@nhs.scot
- Dr Metcalfe will meet with the students as a group prior to the first attachment to give a formal departmental induction.
- Each student will be assigned a CAU middle grade 'buddy' as a point of contact.
- The student (and their buddy) will be introduced to the department through the Acute Medicine email bulletin (sent by Patrick Timmons) each week.
- Please see attached weekly timetable (Appendix 1).
- In addition to these programmed activities, the students are encouraged to observe/assist with procedures, work with the CAU and AAU medical, nursing and AHP staff and complete their assessments as documented above.
- The students also have separate (mainly online) Core Teaching activities set by the University that they need to complete each week. These have been timetabled in the weekly planner but can be undertaken flexibly.

Assessment

- This planner will require iterative development; we will seek formal feedback from each student following their 2 week block to facilitate this.
- You will be given a rota for the allocation of your week in ICU, Beatson Oncology week and oncology clinic in FVRH, plus AAU fortnight.
